

**ARFF 11-9-22: Fun with Tunnels**

(-12.2, 8.5) (22.4, 8.5)

If you want to make this harder, set up the two tunnels with no space between them. Otherwise, you should be able to run between the two tunnels. Straight, or almost straight tunnels are speed traps since your dog will accelerate through them. You have to plan carefully where you want to be as your dog enters and exits them. This is good practice also for sending your dog to and calling your dog through tunnels.

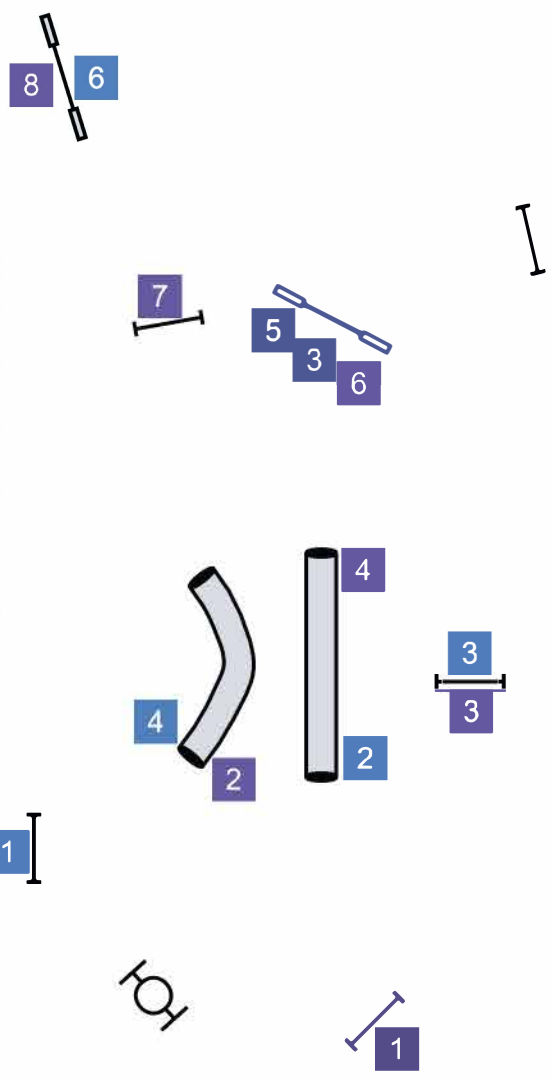
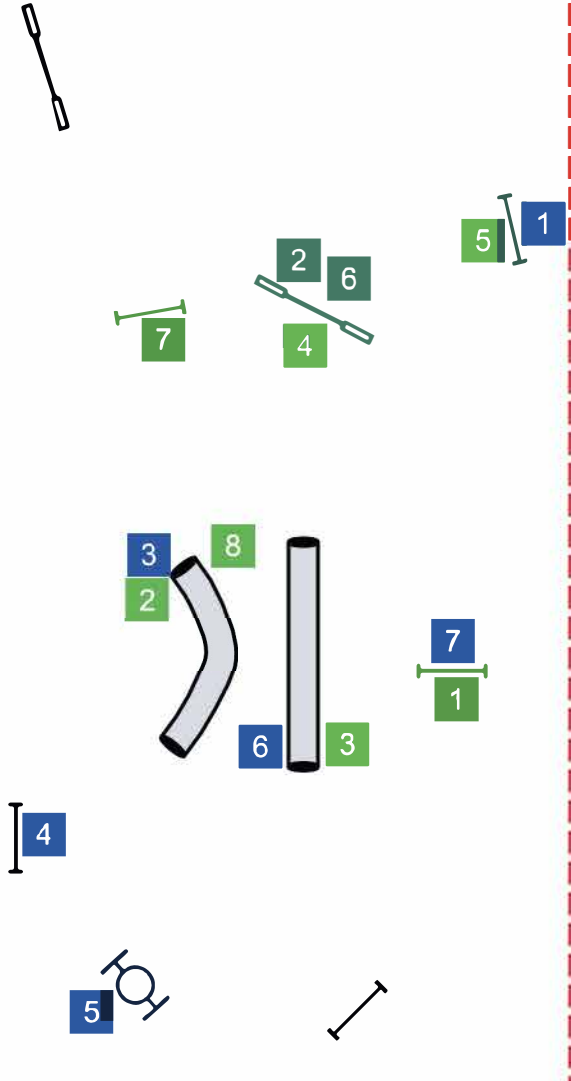
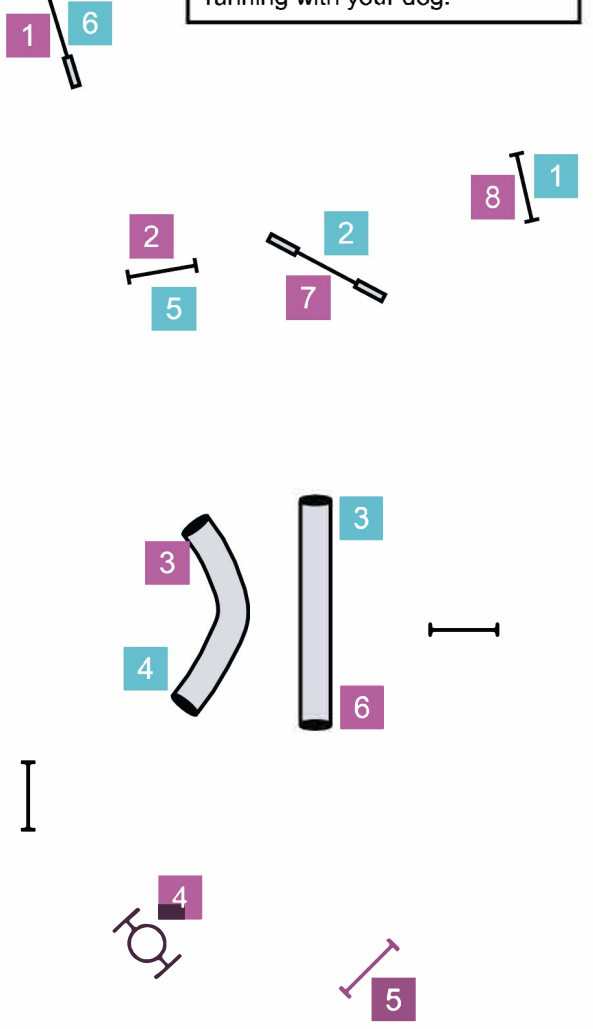

Try teal both with a lead-out and running with your dog.



Which side of the tunnel do you want to be on in each case. Does it help to run on the outside to set up for the next obstacle?

Blue: Run with dog on R on outside of #3. Cross after tire. Green: How to get dog past nearer tunnel? Cross after first tunnel.

Blue: Leading out is key. Purple: Wrap #3. How handle #5-#8?
